Work Begins on Lindberg Bridge

The design is complete, bids advertised and work getting underway to build the Lindberg Road Bridge, the city's first bridge. Plans are to open it to traffic by August 2011.

"Building a bridge is the surest, safest way to guarantee success and longevity," Mayor John Dennis says of replacing the road now running through a marsh.

Road closing and detours will be required, but the city will monitor traffic and post officers if needed.

The bridge is a joint project between the city of West Lafayette and Tippecanoe County. The city's sole expense in the project is the design work, which was funded through the Kalberer/Cumberland/Blackbird Development Area tax-increment-financing district. The county is overseeing and funding construction and inspection through its Cumulative Bridge Fund, which is generated from gasoline taxes.

"In building a bridge, we're relying on known design elements and parameters," says City Engineer David Buck. "Reliance on approximated and widely varying soil properties is eliminated."

American Structurepoint is serving as the engineering consultant, and ATC Associates as geotechnical consultant. "Both have excellent resources and staff for complex projects such as this," Buck says.

"Winter at the Celery Bog reveals another side of the property," says frequent visitor Susan Ulrich. "Without leaves on the trees, you can locate used nests, see squirrels scurrying around after nuts, and appreciate the shape of the land while getting better views of the birds."

Winter visitors she's spotted include White-throated Sparrows, White-crowned Sparrows, Northern Juncos, Purple Finch and others, all mixed in with resident species from Northern Cardinals to woodpeckers.

"Lilly Nature Center's one-way glass provides a warm place to watch birds at the feeders," says Stewardship Coordinator Dan Dunten.

numerous groups and classes, the kitchen will be expanded and a dishwasher, water heater, triple-bay sink, cabinets and countertop installed.



City News

Recycling, Trash Collection. Weekly curbside pickup and not having to sort are helping boost recycling, which is up about 25 percent. The city has introduced a new 48-gallon recycling toter to give residents a larger container. To purchase one, call 775-5242. Also of note: All yard waste picked up is now composted.

Transforming Food to Energy. The Wastewater Treatment Plant is in its second year of processing Purdue food waste, averaging 20 tons a month during the academic year. A new grinder goes online soon. "We hope to generate between \$15,000 and \$20,000 worth of electricity and heat a year from food waste with the new grinder," says Utility Director David Henderson.

Street Work. City Engineer David Buck reports that the second phase of the Cumberland project, Yeager to Salisbury, is now in design with utilities moving next summer and construction beginning

by early 2012. In another project, on Yeager from Northwestern to Sagamore West, he says, "We are purchasing right-of-way, and utilities are planning relocation work." Yeager will be open during the project.

Be a Good Neighbor

Shoveling Snow and Ice. Help your neighborhood this winter. City code requires owners or occupants of property adjacent to sidewalks to remove snow or ice within six hours after daylight or after snow ceases falling. Follow the diagram shown. Arrange for someone to

do it for you if you will be out of town. Please move parked cars off the street during a snowfall and clear snow from mailboxes. The Street Department plows main streets first, then side streets.

Council of Neighborhood Representatives Formed. The newly formed Council of Neighborhood Representatives—one goal in our new strategic plan—met in August and October and convenes again in the spring, says Housing Program Coordinator Dale Dixon. So far, topics among members of 18 neighborhood associations have included signage, traffic and beautification.




